I found that the March skiing at Holiday Valley was the best of the season but then it was gone quickly. If you still desire some good skiing, I'm certain some areas out west will offer that into June.

Some updates within the Western New York Region include:

- Bill McCasey completed his third term as section chief, region representative or assistant region director, whichever you would care to call it. Thanks to Bill for his six years of great service in this position.
- Jay Biersbach is now one of our two region representatives, elected by our eight patrol directors to fill the vacancy. Thanks Jay, for stepping up and volunteering and thanks to the other nominees who agreed to run for this position.

There were 10 students in the class who now have general knowledge of avalanche conditions and emergency responses when they end up in avalanche terrain.

Approximately 40 alumni patrollers and guests from around WNY enjoyed the camaraderie, a delicious meal and some good skiing since the rain held off. 2023 WNY AVALANCHE COURSE

VOLUNTARY RECALL: RECON LT AVALANCHE TRANSCEIVER

3/23/2023

Today, we're issuing a voluntary recall on the Recon LT avalanche transceiver to carry out a necessary firmware update.

In a limited number of cases, the Recon LT could unexpectedly enter search mode, despite its rotary switch remaining in the send position. There have been no accidents or injuries resulting from this malfunction.

This issue is easily eliminated when users update their firmware to version v1.3 or later.

All users should immediately stop using their Recon LT until completing one of the following options:

1. To update your Recon LT, simply download the Pieps app for iOS or Android devices, connect the transceiver via Bluetooth, then follow the on-screen prompts.

2. Send your Recon LT to our service center, where we will perform the update for you free of charge.

3. Receive a full refund from Black Diamond for Recon LT customers.

PRODUCT REVIEW HOT BUNS FROM POWDER CORD POUCHES by Al Quimby

Then I first started patrolling about 15 years ago, I was on duty on a rainy Spring day, and my backside got soaked from sitting on a wet chairlift all day long. I went into the retail shop later that day, and I found this piece of gear, made of Neoprene, that strapped around your waist and legs with Velcro straps. There wasn't a lot to it, just a black piece of Neoprene. It was the original HotBuns Butt Warmer. From that day on, whenever it was raining, or we were laving in the snow for scenarios, I would always put my HotBuns on. Over the years, I have had to buy a couple of new ones because they would eventually tear. One of the things that I didn't like was the Velcro straps. With all my Winter gear on the straps were not really long enough and would come undone throughout the day. The Velcro would also stick to my Synchilla vest at times.



Earlier this year, I decided that I needed a new pair, so I went online searching for them. What I found was an updated version of the original HotBuns that now have webbing straps and nylon buckles instead of Velcro. I was pretty excited, but then I saw that they had their large logo "HotBuns" printed in white on the back side. Being 60+ years old, I really didn't want "Hot Buns" written across my backside while skiing. However, when I looked at the website more closely, I saw a tab labeled Ski Patrol. When I clicked on that, I found that they offer a special Ski Patrol version that has red straps, and a White Cross with the words "Ski Patrol" on the back in place of the "HotBuns"



Logo. Not only that, but they also offer a 20% discount for the Ski Patrol version. This new version of "HotBuns" comes in 3 different sizes, and there is an optional strap extender kit that you can buy if you need more room. WHAT'S ON YOUR RESUME?

was recently having a conversation with some folks working on our patrol's award submissions, and one of them asked this questions: "Is your Ski Patrol Resume up to date?" I know that I keep my professional resume current, but I had never thought about a Ski Patrol resume. Surely, all of that information is stored somewhere, I thought, and our Patrol's Awards Committee has access to that information. The more I thought about it, the more curious I became. I then came up with 3 questions; Why would I need a Ski Patrol Resume; What information should be on that resume; and what information is stored in my NSP records.

WHY WOULD I NEED A SKI PATROL RESUME?

- To assist your local Awards committee to make sure that they have all the information needed to submit awards. It makes their job a lot easier if you can hand them your resume and they can pull dates and information from that. It might be a good idea for the local awards committee to ask all patrollers to maintain a resume and submit it at the end of each year.
- If you applying to join a new patrol or join a patrol as secondary. What a great way to introduce yourself and quickly show your qualifications to a new Patrol Director.
- As a backup in case there are errors on the National database. Anyone ever lose data because of a computer crash? Having a copy of your records can make it easier if something does happen to someone else's database.

WHAT INFORMATION SHOULD BE ON THE RESUME?

- Important Dates, such as the date you joined, dates you gained certifications, dates you held positions, committees, dates of classes you took – NSP and local, any other activities that you did for your patrol or region.
- Awards you received, whether they are local, regional, division or national awards. If you have a copy of the write up citation, that is always nice to include as well.
- All courses that you have taken.
- Patrol memberships including what years you were on those patrols.

- The number of years as an instructor, and the type of instructor; OEC, OET, etc.
- Dates of positions held at all levels such as Patrol Director, Assistant Patrol Director, IT, TE, Hill Chief, Shift Leader, Secretary, Treasurer, and committee chairs and membership.
- Credential dates such as when you attained Senior or Certified.

I included a chronological timeline of all my information. It is interesting to look back over it and wee what I have done over the years. You may have additional information that you want add.

WHAT INFORMATION IS STORED ON THE NSP SITE?

When you log into the NSP website you can see what information is stored there. Just click on "My Account" in the upper right corner. I found that a lot of the basic information is there; the date I joined, Instructor Certifications, NSP Courses completed, NSP Awards, Instructor Records, and any credential information. That was just the basic NSP information. From the NSP site, you can actually print a copy of your record if you like hardcopies. What wasn't in there was any Patrol, Region, or Division participation information. That kind of information is what is really needed by your local Awards committee to submit awards.

In summary, it is a good idea to keep a complete record of all your NSP accomplishments. It doesn't take a lot of time to get started, and then just take a look at it each year and note anything new or any changes. I'm sure that your local Awards Committee will appreciate the effort when they are submitting you for an award.
